In addition, it is also improper to paraphrase or borrow ideas from another, without attribution. If you got an idea from another author, cite that work. It is often appropriate to explain either in text or footnotes how your own argument differs from that previously made by others. You will find other articles' sources/footnotes to be a rich source of information. However, to the extent that you rely on another author said they said. It is never proper to cite a source you have not yourself read, unless you note that you are "citing Source A citing Source B." This should only be done rarely, when that second source is important but cannot be located. To the extent you use other authors' footnotes as starting points you will often find you need to update such footnotes, e.g., by citing to a more current statute or
