# Quantitative Analysis



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# **Course Description**

Thanks to new information and communication technologies, collecting quantitative data has become more convenient than ever. Meanwhile, public policymakers have been held more accountable for their evidence-based programs. This course will provide an introduction to the research process that includes measurement, sampling, data management, analysis, and interpretation. We will learn about quantitative analysis elements through the use of SPSS (Statistical Package for Social Sciences).

# **Methods of Instruction | Interaction and Discussions**

In this residential course, you will interact with other students and me in the classroom, via regular discussion boards, and over MS Teams. You will also meet with me during online office hours to help you solve issues you may have in class exercises and homework assignments.

You are expected to stay engaged in the discussion board activities.

A good discussion post is:

- Substantial (relates to the course material)
- Concise (one screen may be the ideal message length)
- Provocative (encourages others to respond)
- Hermeneutical (expands concepts or connects ideas in new ways)
- Timely (occurs in a reasonable time frame when the topic is under discussion)
- Logical (supports point of view with reasons and evidence)
- Grammatical (is well written)

Only those comments that meet these criteria receive full credit.

### Methods of Evaluation | Assignments, Projects, and Assessments

This course will require six homework assignments, seven class exercises, twelve discussion posts, and a final group project. You will be given an opportunity to revise your exercises and assignments.

Revisions are optional but not required. All written work should be excellent, high-quality academic work. Poorly written, unedited assignments will not be awarded a good grade. It is vital at this stage in your career that you set high standards for your written work product. All word counts include footnotes. Rubrics are provided for your exercise, assignment, discussion post, and final project.

<u>APA citation style</u> is preferred for the final project. ## **Participation**

Each module/week, you will engage in offline and online discussions. Your participation and engagement in these discussions will be assessed each week based on the quality and accuracy of your answers to the assigned questions and tasks as well as your interaction and engagement with your peers (this includes responding to the initial question/task **and** replying to your classmates). Failure to participate in the assigned discussions will significantly affect your grade as it reflects your level of effort in the course's learning community. Your posts, including the accuracy, as well as your replies and comments to your peers should contribute to the overall learning community. Your online participation will be assessed using the **Discussion Rubric**.

Of note, the readings and other materials presented in this course build upon each other so it is critical that you complete the initial assignments early in the module/week so that you may proceed to the next set of materials and assignments. Additionally, it is imperative that you post early so that the class may benefit from your discussion and that you have opportunities to reply to and engage in meaningful dialogue with your peers in the discussion forums as well.

Please keep all modules' topical, subject-related discussions in the assigned module discussion forums. Discussions posted in the **Hallway Discussions** and **Ask Your Professor** discussion forums will not count toward weekly participation.

#### **Attendance**

You are expected to participate in all course activities except where religious observance, serious illness, personal emergency, or a reason that is adequate in my judgment that prevents such participation. **Attendance** means posting answers to discussion questions, participating in the online and classroom community, and submitting all assignments in a timely fashion.

#### **Late Work**

You must complete all activities in this course by the identified deadlines in the **Course Schedule**. Failure to submit an assignment, complete a discussion, or participate as outlined in the **Learning Modules** and **Course Schedule**, will lead to a grade reduction. I recognize that you all have busy personal and professional lives that sometimes make meeting deadlines impossible. Early communication with me is vital if you foresee that. I want to clarify that I expect you to turn in assignments on time. You will lose 10% of the total potential points for each day that an assignment is late, down to 50% off. I will not accept an assignment more than **three** days after its due date.
