**Description:** This course introduces you to legislation and regulation and the role each plays in the administrative state. We find ourselves in a remarkable time to study the role of each branch of government. You will learn to navigate modern U.S. government institutions and processes, with a particular emphasis on understanding the methods and scope of authority of the different branches and levels of government. Your study begins with legislation and includes: the legislative process; statutory text and purpose; theories of statutory interpretation; and canons of statutory construction. You will examine the constitutional framework defining the relationship between Congress, regulatory agencies, and the President. Your focus will move to the regulatory process including: the delegation of authority; the Administrative Procedure Act; notice and comment rulemaking; and other agency actions.

**Learning Outcomes:** Students who successfully complete this course will:

- Demonstrate knowledge of the separation of powers within the constitutional structure of the US legal system,
- Demonstrate knowledge the legislative and regulatory processes and the role of each

in the regulatory state,

- Distinguish among the various theories of statutory interpretation and become proficient in identifying and applying canons of statutory construction, and
- Demonstrate knowledge of role and function of administrative agencies and how agency action is implemented.

Please respect your colleagues and your professor acknowledging the differing opinions of your colleagues and refraining from side discussions and other disruptions.

Students who are absent from twenty (20%) percent of the regularly scheduled classes or who fail to complete required hours for other work shall be automatically withdrawn from the course with a grade of F-Wd.
