COURSE OVERVIEW

Torts is a required JD course that focuses on civil remedies that do not arise under contract for types of harms including personal injury, wrongful death, and/or property damage among others. Topics covered will include: (1) intentional torts, including battery, assault, false imprisonment, intentional infliction of emotional distress, and trespassory intentional torts; (2) negligence, which involves liability for the failure to use reasonable care in the light of foreseeable risks; (3) strict liability, where liability is imposed even if the defendant may have acted reasonably; (4) products liability; and (5) defenses. We will also study types and apportionment of damages.

Torts is a common law subject, meaning that it relies on judicial decisions. Statutes have become increasingly important in tort law, but the course will emphasize case analysis. Torts is tested on the Bar Exam. It is, therefore, important that you develop a strong foundation in tort law.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

1. Demonstrate knowledge of the elements of the intentional torts, negligence, strict liability, and products liability, as well as the defenses to these causes of action.
2. Read, analyze, and brief cases.
3. Articulate theories of liability and explain the rationale for courts' decisions.
4. Identify relevant legal issues, determine the relevant rules, and apply those rules to particular hypotheticals to justify a particular conclusion.
5. Demonstrate a basic knowledge of some of the major steps in the civil litigation process.
6. Produce a competent written analysis of a basic tort hypothetical.
7. Demonstrate professionalism in meeting course responsibilities.

These outcomes will be achieved through careful reading, discussion, responding to objective questions without study aids, and the completion of problems that require you to spot and analyze tort issues in a fact pattern.

GRADING

The grade in this course will be based on the following components:

Closed Book Midterm: 20%
Closed Book Final: 60%

Instructions and additional information on assessments will be posted at a later date. The final course grade may be adjusted up for outstanding class preparation and participation that

demonstrates a level of engagement above and beyond that which is expected at the professional graduate school level. Class participation is measured primarily by its meaningfulness and utility to the discussion. While frequency matters, it is the substance of your contribution that matters more.

The final course grade may also be adjusted down for lack of professionalism, multiple unexcused class absences, and otherwise in the discretion of the professor if a deduction is merited due to disruptive, disrespectful, or offensive conduct in class. Professionalism includes attendance, punctuality, class preparation and participation, responsibility, respect, and civility. Each is explained below.

COURSE EXPECTATIONS

Attendance and Punctuality

Class attendance is required. The attendance policy is explained in more detail in the Vermont Law and Graduate School Student Handbook at [Sec. II.A.](#) Failure to attend class will have a detrimental effect on your understanding of the material and your grade, and it can result in an automatic withdrawal and a grade of F.Wd (failure withdrawal, which does appear on a student's transcript). Read the attendance policy posted in the Handbook before the beginning of the term.

TAKE NOTE: Being late to class four times will equal one full absence. Be in class and be on time. I consider 2:11 as late. Do not leave during class except for emergencies, as this causes a great deal of distraction and disruption, and students who leave class regularly will be warned that further leaves during class will count as tardies, with every four class "leaves" equaling a full absence.

If additional absences are due to a health issue or other extraordinary circumstance beyond your control, please reach out to me as Vice Dean for Students, as a withdrawal or medical leave may be appropriate. You may also contact Vice President Siu Tip Lam for any accommodation request for additional absences. Class Preparation and Participation

You are expected to be prepared for class and to participate regularly. This class, as with most first-year law classes, will use the Socratic method. Students should expect to be called upon to answer questions about the reading materials, or questions based on the reading materials. If you are not prepared on a particular day, you may "pass." If you pass, however, you must select whom I will call on instead of you and your participation grade may suffer.

Email and Canvas

Canvas is a learning management system (LMS), and this course utilizes a Canvas course web page for assignments, videos, slides, documents, possible quizzes, and other items such as discussion forums. You will be automatically enrolled in the course Canvas site, but it is your

responsibility to verify that the email address registered with Canvas is one that you can access and check frequently for course updates. You can access your Canvas settings by clicking “Account” on the top left side of the Dashboard screen, beneath the VLGS logo.

You should check Canvas periodically for updates, and your VLGS email for [Announcements](#) sent through Canvas. This Syllabus and related materials are posted there as well, under correspondingly named tabs on the left side of the screen. Other resources are also posted there. You are responsible for the materials posted under the tabs [Announcements](#), [Syllabus](#), [Modules](#), (this is where all assignments are posted), and any other Required Course Materials in [Files](#). The Reading and Assignments will indicate if there is assigned reading outside of the Casebook.

I use the Announcements function on Canvas to communicate with the class, and these Announcements will be sent directly to your VLGS email and will also be posted in Canvas (in case you need to go back to look at old Announcement for any reason). You must check your VLGS email regularly, meaning at least once a day and probably more often on class days, to ensure that you do not miss any important Announcements. **The VLGS email system is an official method of communication at VLGS and for this course, and it is the primary way that I communicate with you outside class. Please also allow 24 hours for me to respond by email, especially for messages sent after 5:00 p.m. EST on non-class days, and on weekends.**

I encourage you to take notes by hand, even if you typically use a laptop. Handwriting slows down your thought process and forces you to develop your critical listening skills. The use of the internet or email during class is forbidden, unless I indicate otherwise. Texting during class is also prohibited.

Responsibility, Respect, Patience, and Kindness

Please show respect, exercise patience, and use kind words when engaging with everyone throughout this class. Torts is a difficult subject in many ways, and everyone will benefit from knowing up front that we will each at some point say something awkward, uncomfortable, and/or wrong in terms of what is being analyzed. Our classroom is a place where all sides of complex human problems need to be discussed and understood – meaning that you and your classmates will be representing positions that are at odds with other positions that are necessarily also being presented for our full exploration of a topic, and may also be at odds with your own feelings and beliefs. This occurs in practice as an attorney every day. While you need to live in alignment with your beliefs and values, you will need to keep those safe and at bay to best absorb the material to understand the complexities that exist in tort law. Please recognize your patience and kindness with each other, particularly when a classmate is struggling to work through a difficult concept, will support everyone’s learning. Our classroom is a lab, if you will, and we will be working through many problems and experiments together, using new language and new ways of thinking.

In terms of class itself, please arrive before the time for class to start and be ready to dive in. **Other than scanning the QR code for attendance or accessing your digital text or material I’ve directed you to in class, you are not allowed to use your cell phone.** The following are

not allowed: texting, checking email, playing games, updating Instagram, Facebook, shopping, and other computer or smartphone activities.

Also in class, students must raise their hand and wait to be called on before speaking. If you are not speaking, please listen to the contributions of your classmates. Please do not interrupt when someone is speaking, and know that I will limit how far the conversation goes with questions and hypotheticals – and sometimes I may not answer your question (though I will always tell you why). I will also not be able to call on you every time you raise your hand, and this translates to being more so for students who frequently contribute to our class discussions. There are many reasons why I may not call on someone who has their hand raised including the class flow or pace in terms of material that needs to be covered in a class, or to give other students who are less inclined to raise their hand, more opportunities to engage. It is never because I am disinterested in a student's contributions.
